	Task
	Research the chosen genre by watching films and taking notes of conventions and techniques used in that genre.
	Prepare the storyboard (if you don't draw, take pictures)
	Talk to the director, sharing your vision and seek feedback on that.
	Talk to the editor about shot. Transitions, effects and coverage.
	Prepare shotlist
	Book equipments
	Check equipments before leaving school, making sure all elements are present (tripod mounts, cables and so on).
	Make sure you have at least two batteries for your camera and a charger
	Know your camera inside out
	Know what the lenses can do
	Make sure your light kit has all the batteries charged or that your location has power plugs.
	Way before shooting, carry out tests with the camera, lenses, light kit.
	Prepare floor plans with the light setup and camera setup.
	Create a checklist of all equipment you will be carrying to location for every shooting.
	Arrive before the talents (actors) at the location to setup lights and camera.
	During shooting, don't be afraid of letting the director know if the take was not good (actor miss the blocking, camera glitch or so on).
	Every break you have, make sure to copy the memory card.
	Suggest different shots to your director if you think it will enhance the story.
	Make sure to shoot some b roll (close ups, small actions, objects).
	Make a daily journal of your decisions done on set, so any changes can be repeated next day and you can let your editor know.
	Make sure you have scheduled with the director a day for reshoots/pickup shots.
	Collaborate with the editor on the color grading of your film.
